IN THE SPOTLIGHT: ADAPTING QUALITY STROKE CARE TO COVID-19



Denis Lalonde (Maintenance) and Sarah Fitzpatrick (SLP)

"The Speech Language Pathologist (SLP) at Glengarry Memorial Hospital Inpatient Stroke Rehab (Sarah Fitzpatrick) expected some changes to her interactions with patients as a result of COVID-19. She worked together with the hospital's Maintenance Team and the IT department to build two novel solutions that would ensure speech and language assessment and therapy was not interrupted. The first creation was a telepractice station created by the IT department, which patients can use if they are COVID-19 positive or symptomatic. It allows the patient to videoconference with the SLP from a distance. The other project was for Denis Lalonde from the Maintenance team to build a moveable treatment table: the table has a plexiglass window separating patient and provider so there is very little risk of exposure. It's on wheels so it's easy to move from one treatment area to another."
